



## ADOOR Gopalakrishnan



"The Master and Architect of Malayalam and Indian Cinema"

Adoor Gopalakrishnan is a renowned Indian filmmaker, screenwriter, and director, primarily associated with the Malayalam cinema. He is considered one of the greatest directors in Indian cinema, known for his unique style of filmmaking and his contribution to the Indian New Wave movement. Adoor Gopalakrishnan was born on July 3, 1941, in Adoor, a small town in Kerala, India. # E PICACE, JAPA



Japan is an island country in East Asia. It is located in the Pacific Ocean off the northeast coast of the Asian mainland, and is bordered on the west by the Sea of Japan and extends from the Sea of Okhotsk in the north to the East China Sea in the south. Some of the famous tourist places in japan are Mount Fuji, Tokyo Tower, Tokyo Skytree, Tokyo Disneyland, Osaka Castle, Tempozan Giant Ferris Wheel, Universal Studios Japan, Osaka Aquarium Kaiyukan. Mount Fuji, located in Japan, is an iconic symbol of the country. Standing at 3,776 meters, it offers breathtaking views and attracts thousands of visitors each year, both climbers and sightseers alike.

Japan's Mount Fuji or most commonly known as "Fuji-san," is an active Stratovolcano in the southwest of Tokyo. Fuji-san, as the natives like to call it, is among Japan's "Three Holy Mountains" including Mount Tate and Mount Haku. It is situated in FujiHakone-Izu National Park, standing tall at 3,776.24 meters.

Mt. Fuji is a symbolic beauty in and around Japan for widely known reasons; it is not only a scenic beauty that attracts tourists from all around the world but also a cultural icon of Japan.

The Japanese cultural art and photography is highly inspired by the "snow-capped" mountain and is often witnessed in paintings and pictures. This is not even half of what Mt. Fuji has to offer. Every year, almost more than a million tourists visit the mountain out of which approximately 300,000 climb up to its peak. The traditional cuisine of Japan (Japanese: washoku) is based on rice with miso soup and other dishes with an emphasis on seasonal ingredients. Side dishes often consist of fish, pickled vegetables, and vegetables cooked in broth.



The o-hitashi or hitashi-mono is boiled green-leaf vegetables bunched and cut to size, steeped in dashi broth eaten with dashes of soy sauce. Another item is sunomono ( "vinegar item"), which could be made with wakame seaweed or be something like a kōhaku made from thin toothpick slices of daikon and carrot. The so-called vinegar that is blended with the ingredient here is often sanbaizu which is a blend of vinegar, mirin, and soy sauce. A tosazu adds katsuo dashi to this.



#### EARLY POSTAL STAMPS:



Long before the advent of postage stamps, India had established

postal systems. The Mouryan empire (322-185 BCE) utilised couriers for official communications, a practice that continued through subsequent dynasties.

Following Independence in 1947, India



began issuing stamps that celebrated its new form sovereignty and rich cultural heritage. The first stamp of independent India. released on November

21, 1947, depicted the Indian flag and was intended for foreign correspondence.


